

## **The Role of Local Government in Rural Development**

The diagram below summarizes the main pathways through which local government can contribute to rural development.

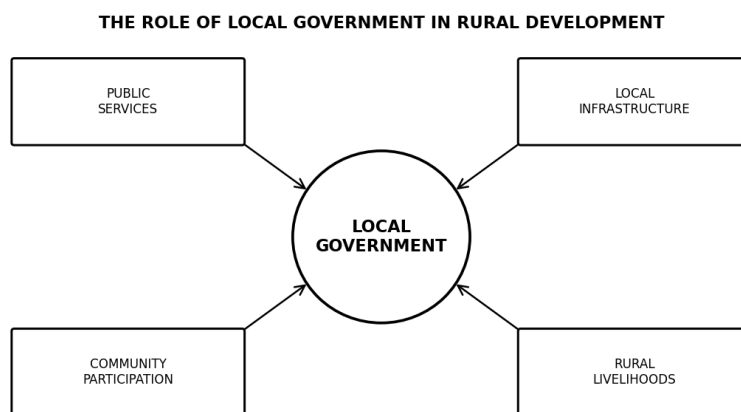


Figure 1. Simplified overview of local government and rural development.
