The diagram below summarizes the major constitutional and democratic functions of the Supreme Court.

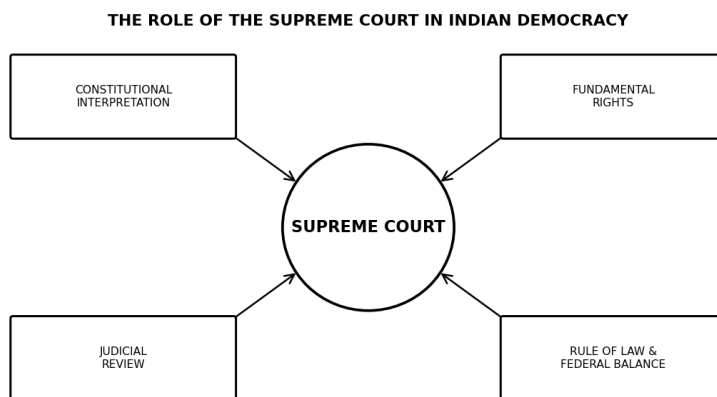


Figure 1. Simplified overview of the role of the Supreme Court in Indian democracy.
